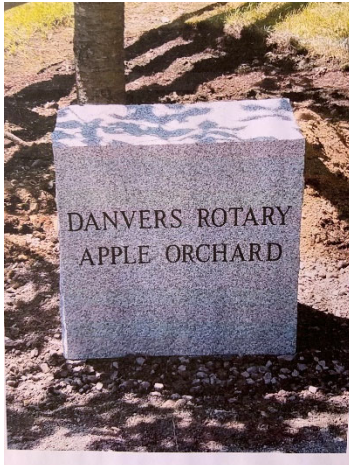
Sorry no speaker today – Here are some information on Camp Rotary

Polio this week as of 11 September 2019

- The Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) partners and the United Arab Emirates co-hosted an informal reception at a pre-event ahead of the Polio Funding Mission in the United Arab Emirates hosted by the Ministry of Health in Abu Dhabi in November 2019. The GPEI story presented the 2019-2023 GPEI investment case. Read [more](#).

- Summary of new viruses this week: Afghanistan — one wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) case; Palestine — four wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) cases and 20 WPV2-positive environmental samples; Central African Republic (CAR) — one circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 (cVDPV2) case and one cVDPV2-positive environmental sample; Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) — one cVDPV2 case.

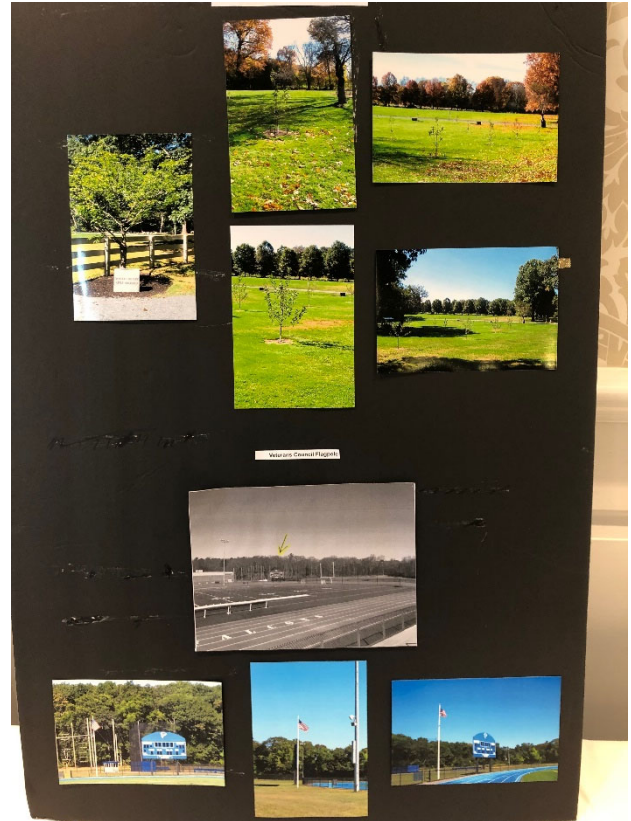

The "10 Warning Signs" of primary immunodeficiency (PID) are:

1. Recurrent or severe infections within a year
2. Two or more serious bacterial infections within a year
3. Two or more months on antibiotics with little effect
4. Two or more deep-seated fungal infections
5. Failure of infection to clear spontaneously
6. Recurrent otitis media or sinusitis
7. Two or more episodes of otitis media within a year
8. Need for intravenous antibiotics in two infections
9. Two or more deep-seated bacterial infections
10. A family history of PID or immunodeficiency

In addition to the FRRs, the GPEI also provides updated information on available resources from public and private sector donors against the FRRs.
